Why Should You Consider Mediation?

- It offers you and your Employment First Case Manager the opportunity to work together to resolve concerns that may arise.
- It is a way to protect your rights within the Employment First program.
- It is private and confidential.
- It reduces stress.
- It opens up lines of communication.
- It is voluntary.
- It helps you get the information you need to make decisions.
- It helps you identify what is important to you in becoming self-sufficient.
- It is flexible and convenient.
- It is a free service for Employment First participants.

Who Can Request Mediation?

- Employment First participants
- Employment First Case Managers or Supervisors

When Should You Request Mediation?

If you disagree with a decision regarding your Self-Sufficiency Contract.



When the Self-Sufficiency Contract is not being followed or maintained.



When communication with your Employment First Case Manager becomes difficult and needs improving.



If you are notified by the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) about an adverse action that you don't agree with.



If having other service providers involved would be helpful.

What Else Should You Know About Mediation?

- Mediation involves you, your Employment First Case Manager, and one or two neutral mediators. You can also ask other resource people to participate.
- You can speak for yourself in an informal, flexible setting.
- The only preparation on your part is thinking about what you need in order to become self-sufficient.
- Sessions usually last two to three hours.
- If you choose to request mediation, your request must be submitted within 90 days following the date the notice of adverse action is mailed. If you submit a request for mediation within 10 days following the date the notice is mailed, the adverse action will not take effect until a decision is reached through mediation.
- DHHS pays for the mediation and the mediation center makes the necessary meeting arrangements.
- If an agreement between you and your Employment First Case Manager is reached, participants will sign and receive a copy of the agreement. The agreement becomes part of your DHHS file.
- If an agreement is not reached, you can request a fair hearing within five (5) days of receiving notification from the mediator.
- Services are provided by trained volunteer mediators connected with nonprofit mediation centers located in your area.
